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### Director's note: 12th year of operation



What a roller coaster of a year! Once again I look back in gratitude to our supporters and the growing team, family and friends. 2023 was filled with challenges and also losses. But the BWRC team also got to celebrate many small victories and major milestones, and even received global recognition as a Winner of the Inclusive GEF Assembly Challenge Program.

In 2023 BWRC provided free veterinary care and rehabilitation or health checks in the field for 516 animals of 65 different species, and hospitalized 180 patients. 56 releases were of course an absolute highlight for the team. 36 animals transferred, and many cooperative rescues highlighted the importance of our partnerships. Starting of course with the Forest Department, but also BFREE, FCD, Green Iguana Project, TBZ, Turtle Ecology Lab, CRC, Belize Bird Rescue and Belize Raptor Centre helped us work towards the conservation mission in 2023, aided by countless caring individuals, volunteers and certified wildlife ambassadors!

The BWRC's Wildlife Ambassador Program hosted the first national conference and the team completed its first GEF-SGP grant as well as the GIZ Selva Maya One Health grant, touring the entire nation and leaving 396 trained individuals. Noteworthy was an increase in intakes of relinquished wildlife after training workshops. Some final phase I results are presented and the continuation is to roll out in March 2024! Our gratitude to the funders and the persons that helped along the way is endless.

How did we make ends meet for our team of 8? I can't say thank you enough to all the grantors, business sponsors as well as every individual supporter and volunteer! Thanks to your support and BWRC's amazing staff and last but not least our Board! Student groups and interns returned and the annual gala was an amazing gathering of friends and supporters and thanks to the San Ignacio Resort Hotel and a long list of business supporters an amazing success (see list in report). And we thank each and every one of you!

Most exciting accounting and end of the year news: Thanks to the Holtzman Foundation and NGO source BWRC was certified as equivalent to a US Non-profit in December 2023! And also in December BWRC received a 25,000\$ pledge towards the building of the clinic from Blancaneaux Lodge Community Fund! We hope to start the building of the BWRC Wildlife Classroom in its permanent site soon and grant search for the clinic itself continues.

No shortage of news from a year that felt like a rollercoaster, brought on many challenges and difficult tasks but also opportunities which ultimately saw BWRC grow to new levels.

I hope you enjoy the annual reports from the team and wish you only the best of Health, Happiness and Prosperity for 2024!

While most of our wildlife patients are accounted for under "GOB" for the Forest Department we accounted separately for wildlife patients and field support to the Belize Foundation for Research and Environmental Education - BFREE, Friends for Conservation and Development - FCD, San Ignacio Resort Hotel Green Iguana Project - SIRH, The Belize Zoo - TBZ, Crocodile Research Coalition - CRC, Turtle Ecology Lab - TEL and of course Government of Belize Forest Department and we have listed the value of **charitable veterinary services** for 2023 below:

We did also look into the values provided for different animal groups and efforts and will soon share more lessons learned from our 2023 numbers.

FAQ: Why do we write invoices for wildlife or "clients who don't pay"...? Our wildlife patients do not pay their bills and cooperation with conservation partners is part of BWRC's mission and vision. But we account for each patient seen and the value of services provided. Then we have our accountant "write off" these charitable service expenses once per year. This means BWRC provides service to the Government of Belize and approved conservation partners nationwide at no charge to them and we raised the funds to cover those costs thanks to You and our team.

# 3. Outreach and Capacity building Program: Wildlife Ambassador Program - Phase I concluded in 2023 - to be continued in 2024!

Thanks to GEF-Small Grants Program Belize and One Health GIZ Selva Maya, BWRC was able to develop and roll out the nationwide outreach and capacity building under the Wildlife Ambassador Program for a total of 2 years, concluding in October of 2023. While many more activities were conducted by our team, we just wanted to share some of the impact highlights from our final presentation given in Cancun, MX in October 2023. Please do not hesitate to ask for further information. And if you are curious, please join the program HERE as we will continue this important effort.



The team concluded with **17** monthly Facebook LIVE events, which were also recorded and uploaded to <u>BWRC's Youtube Channel</u>.

The team posted 3-5 weekly social media posts with total views of **367,103** 

**27** workshops completed, bringing us to a total of **396** certified ambassadors.

2 snake training workshops for 32 persons.

**188** of Ambassadors were enforcement officers (Police officers and the Belize Defence Force).

264 males and 121 females.

**1282** wildlife calls were received on the Hotline

371 cases resolved via phone call

**217** Wildlife Traffic or conflict interventions

1960 Miles tracked in the Wildlife Ambulance

393 animals received at BWRC

**1063** animals seen in the field

**87** animals released

16 Newsletters that were disseminated.



The first national conference was held on the 28<sup>th</sup> of January 2023, with the goal to bring together national and regional partners in Wildlife conservation and One Health, turned out to be a great success. Additionally, the educators were invited to the Morning Show on national television to discuss and inform about WAP. (see picture below).



And, the best news for last: as we were concluding our first phase of workshops, we had received many requests for further training and further initial workshops. In working towards continued funding for the WAP we were absolutely elated to be announced as a winner of the global Inclusive GEF Assembly Challenge Program on August 23, 2023.

### 4. Financial news, Income and Expenses

Financial Officer's numbers 2023: This year we have seen the organization's annual budget grow to \$368,190.91 in 2023. This would not be possible without the help of grants, and while it entails more work in office and on the grounds, thanks to Melissa, we have the certainty of BWRC's mission and our core value of transparency and best practices, in accounting, is being fulfilled every year. Accounting and auditing are a must for a growing organization, and in 2023 we were delighted to have on board L3G's Accounting services, with Mrs. Fatima Chi as our external accountant. She has been awesome in guiding us through new transitions and making sure our books are up to date. We have also appreciated the voluntary assistance at times by Glendy and of course we have been joined in 2023 by Miss Aisha Magana. Our office team has taken on significant effort and cost, as BWRC transitioned to a newer version of the software in 2023 and we continue this transition to the beginning of February. For this reason minor changes in number are still possible.

### 5. 2023 Highlights and News:

It is hard to pick favorites. In the past we have at times shared much of the hardship, mentioning lowlights and abuse cases. For 2023 we want to focus on the positives and share a just few favorites for you:

Dr. I: My personal vet activity favorites remain the field related efforts through our support to the Scarlet Macaw Program with Friends for Conservation and Development – FCD, which saw 13 macaws fledge into the Chiquibul in 2023. As well, the Hickatee Conservation Program by our friends at BFREE – Belize Foundation for Research and Environmental

Education, where we did health checks for 208

Hickatees.





My favorite rescue of the year: Valentina the tapir, thanks to Corporal Ba for his compassion, and physical assistance of BDF, as well as Humberto Wohlers and the amazing The Belize Zoo (TBZ) team. Rescued from Augustine Pine Ridge BDF camp, the Sunday before Valentine's day, with the help from the Zoo and the BDF soldiers. Quite an effort and a rare case to be able to rescue an adult tapir and bring it into care. Sadly, she ultimately succumbed to underlying conditions 2 months later, but until then she enjoyed the amazing care and compassion of the TBZ team.

My favorite quick happy ending case of the year: rescuing, stabilizing and reuniting an electrocuted baby howler monkey with his troop and mom at Jaguar Paw, thanks to caring tour guides who stepped in and called for our help. While the injury was videoed and appeared almost surely fatal, this little guy showed incredible resilience and spirit and his return to his troop and mom and little over 24 h later was a very emotional moment.



My favorite long unusual and happy ending case involving all of the team members and our partners: a neonate red brocket deer, rescued by FCD by a hunters' camp in distress, reared and rehabilitated over 6 month at BWRC and then soft released in the Chiquibul and seen several times post release in good condition (and not approaching humans!)







Godwin here (Head of animal care): In a heartwarming moment, my eyes welled up with tears of joy as I spotted the resilient red brocket deer, released months earlier, alive and thriving in the release area. Despite bearing a few scars, she maintained a cautious distance, observing me with curiosity. Overwhelmed with happiness, I stood in awe, savoring the moment. Moments later she gracefully vanished into the nearby bushes, leaving me with a profound sense of gratitude for her resilience and the beauty of this shared connection with nature!





Another quick 2023 highlight from Godwin Castillo: Rescued from a dog mauling, a young nine banded

armadillo endured severe injuries with about 2 to 3 inches of flesh torn on its side and a perforated back armor. After careful assessment, x-rays, and anesthesia, a dedicated team worked tirelessly for weeks to debride/clean, medicate, and nurture her wounds. Weeks later the armadillo not only improved but made a complete recovery, Ultimately returning to the wild. Gratitude goes to all of the heroes behind her remarkable journey to recovery!

### 5.1. New faces and New adventures

We are elated to have our team joined by Debora Olivarez in the Animal Care Program and Aisha Magana as an administrative assistant (and of course Jack of many trades as about every



single team member of BWRC). As BWRC continues to grow in staff we continue to stay busy. And our newest staff members have fit in amazingly well! The only reason we can achieve what we hope for as an organization is because each of our team members come together as individuals with different strengths, but the same passion for the animals and environment joined under the same mission. Thank YOU TEAM!

Last but not least we are excited for our educator Giann Vasquez, who has left to complete his Masters in Biodiversity under the Erasmus Mundus Tropimundo scholarship. This will take him to study in Belgium, Reunion (French territory in the Indian Ocean) and Italy before returning to Belize in 2025.

The Board held its annual meeting on December 28th 2023. After a brief annual summary all directors agreed to continue and one new

# 6. 7th Annual Chiquibul Challenge Marathon - CCM 2023 - Fundraiser for Macaw Program

The 2023 Chiquibul Challenge Marathon saw a total of 58 runners (7 full-marathon, 51 half-marathon). The total funds raised were \$20,355. The amazing Las Cuevas Research Station team once again provided excellent service to our challengers and earned \$6,201 for the intense 24h event. After the expenses of \$17,909 the profit of \$2,445 was then split between BWRC and FCD (with \$1,222.5 each) to support the Scarlet Macaw Monitoring Project. 2023 was, with the exception of the 2021 virtual run (COVID version), the smallest number of runners



since inception in 2017. And while we were overjoyed to count on the incredible support of BWRC's business sponsors of many years, providing amazing prizes for our Challenge winners once again (please see list at the end of this report!) some larger sponsors could no longer participate.

Regardless of the fact that the fundraising was less successful, our equally important goals with this event: awareness of the Chiquibul's beauty and threats to conservation, encouraging fitness, coupled with a touch of education were accomplished. We can certainly confirm that participants enjoyed the Chiquibul and the Challenge to fitness. We believe that runners (and walkers..) appreciated the amazing nature and recognized the need for conservation and the crucial work done by Friends for Conservation - FCD.



While this may come as sad news to many of you asking for the 2024 dates, we will take this opportunity to share that in our 8th year of "Racing for Conservation", we will not organize this conservation, fitness and fundraiser event in Spring 2024! We are envisioning Fall 2024 and we will change things up, including with a different location too! We want to improve some aspects of race logistics, which should also make the event less costly in the registration to runners. But we can guarantee a challenge in terrain and beautiful nature, as well as the use of any funds raised going to support species conservation in the field. # Behind the scenes...3 years of support! We can't thank you enough

The impact and importance of the support from Mark and Rebecca from Nature Trust of the Americas is beyond good enough words! Starting at our worst (2020... shutdown of all income for BWRC, but essential workers caring for 40 patients in house) NTOTA stepped in to help in countless ways. From providing needed equipment, getting us on the road again, financial support to joining





and providing guidance as a member of the BWRC Board of Directors and purchasing the land for our permanent home, your help makes a world of a difference!

### 8. BIG Needs in 2024:

BWRC would benefit from the expertise of a **social media manager**, responsible for all our social media platforms. This would include keeping our followers up to date with activities occurring at the clinic, possible opportunities, outreach and awareness, services and classes available and liaising with our clinic manager, educator and hotline coordinator for materials to share and referring inquiries made through direct messages of all platforms.

Having acquired a permanent home site for the clinic and educational facilities, and having placed the first infrastructures in 2023 and acquired funding for an educational building, the BWRC will need further funding, as well as a **contractor**, to build an educational building in early 2024. And of course, we need to continue to **fundraise**. The clinic building cost estimate came out to **US\$340.000** and we have an extremely generous matching grant offer for US\$150,000. This means once we raise US\$ 150,000, this will be matched and we would be almost there to complete the building!

## Just to give you an idea of our average cost and some examples of items needed:

- o In 2023 the care for one wildlife patient on average cost 165\$ (with much variation depending on species and injury of course).
- o BWRC needs to purchase further caging at 5 x 300\$/carrier.
- o Special diets cost about 1,000\$ per year.
- -Donating supplies also helps BWRC to carry out its daily tasks in wildlife conservation. We are always in need of wound care supplies, fluids, bandage materials, sheets, towels, pillow cases, syringes, needles, rubber gloves, cleaning supplies, animal feed and more.





- -Of course as a business sponsor you could also donate items towards our annual fundraising auctions (Art pieces, tourism services and more) and/or support our annual Chiquibul Challenge Marathon with prizes for the winners.
